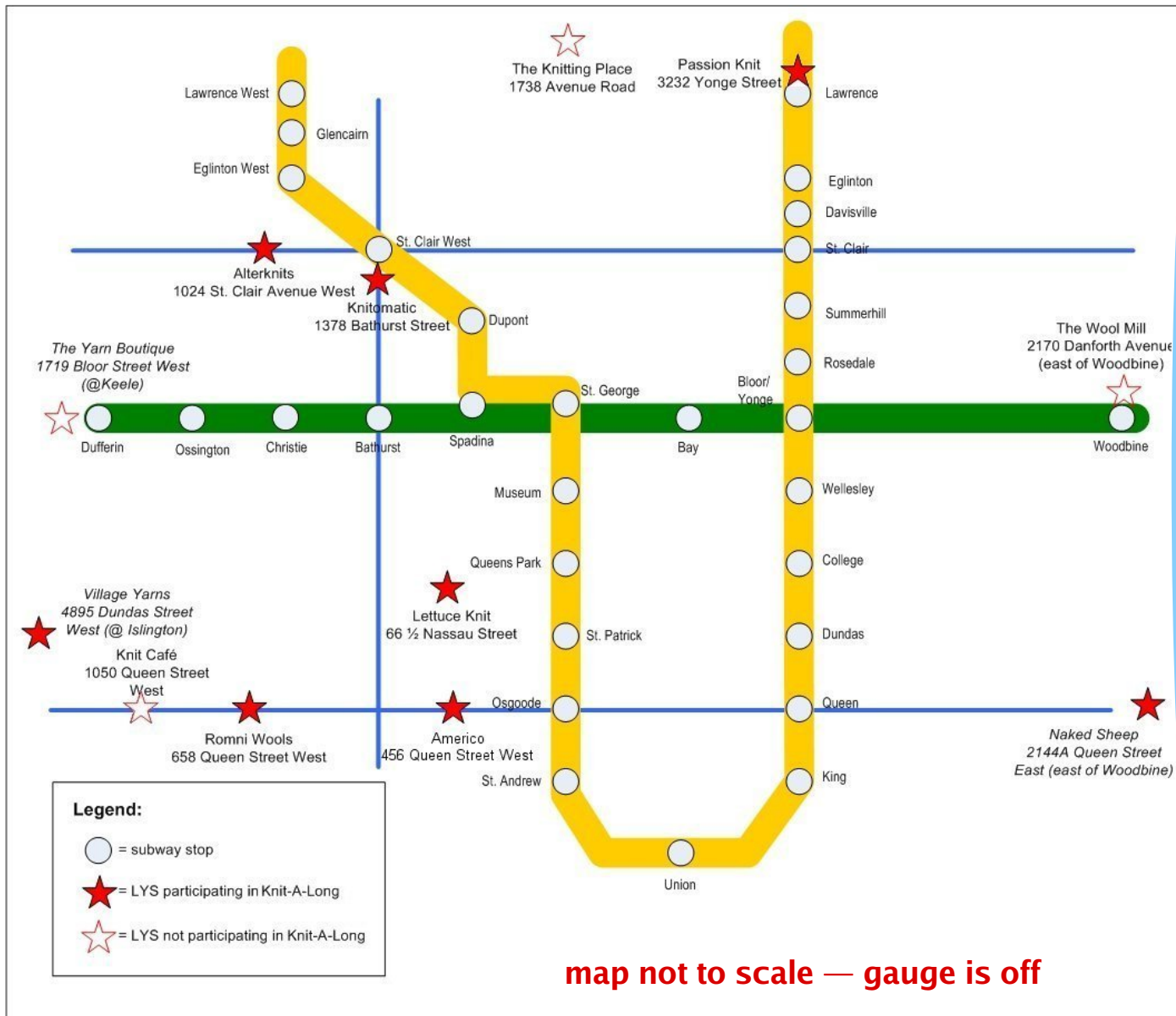


The Great TTC Knit-A-Long
